Words from the South

This year marks the 300th anniversary of “Modern Freemasonry”, and once the 2017 Grand Lodge officers are installed I’m sure we’ll be hearing a lot about that anniversary this year.

Many of you already know much more about masonic history than I’ll ever know, but for the benefit of those who aren’t familiar with the history of the fraternity I thought I would talk about this a little bit.

It seems like a lot of folks are under the impression that Freemasonry is a 300 year old institution and that we got our start in 1717 when four lodges decided to create the Grand Lodge of England.

The part that some folks don’t realize is that these four lodges already existed, and had existed for an untold number of years prior to them forming the first grand lodge. Additionally, those weren’t the only lodges at the time, we know that there were many others as well.

Prior to 1717, Freemasonry truly was a Secret Society and few people who weren’t involved with it even know of its existence. When the Grand Lodge of England was formed, there were many lodges that were unhappy to see some lodges emerge from the veil of secrecy to publicly acknowledge the existence of the fraternity. There are many great books written about this topic, and if you’re curious to know more I would recommend picking up one of those books. The history is truly fascinating.

When the fraternity was actually founded is a topic that has been debated for ages, and is sometimes one of the topics discussed around the table when a bunch of us get together for chow. It’s also something that I find extremely interesting to learn about.

It’s been well documented that masonic lodges met well into the mid 1600s, and some accounts even suggest that lodges can be traced back to the 1500s. There are also documents dated in the late 1300s that are tied to the fraternity, and other folks present some compelling arguments that it goes back

much further than that.

While not everyone will agree on when the fraternity was founded, it is clear that the roots of our beloved institution go way back in history. So, when you hear the talk about our 300th anniversary, just keep in mind that our ancient brothers were getting together long before 1717.

I expect they will be well ahead of the curve when they get here. It will be a good time.

The Ghosts of Masters Past

Hello again Brethren. This month I am speaking with Worshipful Master Bill Young. I have to say Brother Bill is my favorite Past Master, he and I go way back. We were friends before joining the Lodge. We have seen the birth of each other's children, the deaths of each other's parents and we have seen the worst this world can throw at someone. Bill is a true brother to me as well as a fraternal brother. I have always had the utmost respect for Bill as I'm sure most of you have as well. Bill is never at a loss for words and his year as Master was one of the most exciting years of Lodge that I have been a part of. Now let's delve a little deeper into the mind of Brother Bill and see what he has brought back from the East.

Q- You have made it well known that you feel you did not have a good year as Master. Why do you feel that way and what do you feel that you would have done different?

A- So, at the beginning of the year I knew that if I did nothing but sit in the East everybody would have shook my hand at the end of the year and said, "Good job. You had a great year." Even if I would have done nothing. And so I knew that and I didn't want that to be the expectation of the lodge. I wanted to keep going, progressing and making the lodge more important more meaningful. So I set up some expectations for the officers, maybe too many and we didn't do even half of what I laid out. And that was disappointing. The same guys did everything all the time and that was disappointing. If I had to do it again, I would set lower expectations and I would do a better job of setting appropriate expectations for peoples skills set instead of having a straight across bar of "this is what I want people to do". Because I didn't use people appropriately based on their strengths I tried to make everybody do the same thing, that wasn't good. That was part of the disappointment too.

Q- How have your views on Masonry changed from your first year after joining and after serving as Master?

A- I will say from my first day from becoming a member until now being gone a year out, I understand that the connection that we have as Masons and I see the bigger picture of what Masonry is. I think in the Blue Lodge we kind of get caught up in the Tuesday to Tuesday race there and I can see that now maybe now

why it's important. I think that when the newness wears off, when the conspiracy theories and the secrets go away, you start to get a better understanding of what you're apart of and with that your appreciation of that fraternity grows a little bit.

Q- You have been noticeably absent after your year as Master. Why have you taken this time away from Lodge and how has it affected your outlook on Masonry?

A- I was pissed after my year. There was some things that happened, some things that didn't happen. Some conversations that I had and I was pissed. My year did not go like I thought it would be, you know, as I was going through the chairs? I see now that that was partially my fault, but I needed some time to figure out if it was really worth it and if it was what I really wanted out of Masonry and if I still wanted to be a part of it. I think the time away has deepened my understand for what it means to be a brother and it has given me some perspective that I didn't have when I was focused on the ritual and the pancake feed and whether or not Carl was telling me everything he was doing. I can see now the relationships that we have and the common ground that we build up and I needed to step away to see that.

Q- Do you plan on becoming active in Lodge again and if so do you have any ideas you'd like to contribute or suggestions for the current line?

A- Absolutely, I will be active again. I consider myself an active Mason now as far as living my life according to our obligations and still researching and keeping lines of communication open with the brothers. I haven't participated in any lodge activities in a while, but it's a good thing I didn't because I needed to take that time to figure out why I was so upset and why things happened the way they happened.

everybody else. Pick one thing that you want to accomplish and put your heart and soul into it and try to do it. The accomplishment of a Master is not measured in the 12 months you're in the East, but measured in decades and centuries that the craft has been around. Its understanding and knowing what it really means to be a brother and take some time to enjoy it now and learn who your brothers are. Learn what they can and can't do and when you get the opportunity to become pillar or to sit in the East use that knowledge and use them effectively based on their skill set. You'll get disappointed if you try to get them to do something they cannot do. Some people aren't ritualists, don't make them ritualists, some people can't plan a hamburger feed, don't have them plan a hamburger feed. Some people are afraid to call other lodges and visit. Don't have them do that. Just know what they can do and have them do it. And have your one thing and know that at the end of your year, even if you accomplish nothing, we will still shake your hand and say good year.

Q- What is something you'd like to see for the

future of our Lodge?

A- I've always wanted our lodge to be the "spot" where the guys hang out, where the kids play together, where everything happens. We've had glimpses of that, we've had little moments like Superbowl parties and birthday parties and things where that's what I want it to be, but the lodge and our relationship with each other has to become more important and we have to work on that. My best times in lodge were standing outside until 10:00, 11:00 or midnight talking in the parking lot and hanging out afterwards and that. I know that there are people that are Shriners and in other bodies and that's where they go to do their things but what I'd really like to see is Blue Lodge become that place where we all get together and we actually enjoy it instead of it being like a job

I think we can all agree with the thoughts Bill has given in this interview. I know I, for one, would like to see the Lodge that he describes in the answer to the last question. Until next month Brothers.

Traveling Gavel

At our December business meeting, several brothers from Mizpah Lodge #302 brought the Traveling Gavel to present to our lodge.



For those who aren't familiar with it, the "M.W. James L. (Sonny) Eatmon Traveling Gavel" was presented as a gift to the Grand Lodge by the family of Past Grand Master James L. "Sonny" Eatmon in 2005. Since then, the gavel departs Annual Communication each year going to the lodge of the new Grand Master.



It then becomes the responsibility of at least four brethren (two of which should be officers) of that lodge to visit another lodge within 30 days to carry and deposit the gavel to the visited lodge. That lodge will then hold the same obligation of visiting and depositing the gavel in another lodge within 30 days.

The Traveling Gavel has become a symbol of unity and cooperation within the Nebraska Lodges, and it's a great way of encouraging visitations among the lodges and the brethren

On Tuesday January 3rd, several members of

Papillion Lodge visited Waterloo Lodge #102 to fulfill our part in the Traveling Gavel tradition. WB Geoffrey Talmon presented the gavel, and Carl Highman, Ken Kolodzie, Curtis Marr, and I attended as well.

Mt. Calvary Commandery #1 K.T.

As I sit down to write this month's trestleboard article for Commandery, I'm in a bit of a history mood. So, I thought I would share a little Knights Templar history. Most of my fellow York Rite companions who are involved in Commandery are already well familiar with the history of the Knights Templar. However, for the rest of you, I hope you'll find this brief history blurb to be at least a bit informative and interesting.

The Knights Templar were founded in Jerusalem at the Church of the Holy Sepulchre, on the spot that marks the crucifixion, burial, and resurrection of Jesus Christ on Christmas Day in the year 1119. On that day, Hugh de Payns (who became the first Grand Master of the Knights Templar), Godfrey de Saint-Omer, and several other knights took their vows before the patriarch of the church and they took on the name "Poor Fellow-Soldiers of Christ".

Originally Hugh and Godfrey had asked the Patriarch of Jerusalem and King Baldwin II if they could withdraw to a life of contemplation at a monastery or form a lay community. The knights had recently fought in the

First Crusades and they sought absolution for their sins in the war. Instead, King Baldwin asked the knights to save their souls by protecting pilgrims on the road to Jerusalem.

Most of the knights and soldiers who fought in the First Crusade returned home as soon as the war was finished. The roads from Europe down into Jerusalem quickly became dangerous, and unarmed pilgrims making their trek to the Holy Land became frequent victims of robbery, rape, and murder on the roads along the eastern coast of the Mediterranean.

The "Poor Fellow-Soldiers of Christ" were given use of the al-Aqsa mosque to store arms, clothing, food, stable horses, and use as their headquarters. The mosque is a great underground vault at the southeast corner of the Temple Mount. They became known as the "Poor Fellow-Soldiers of Christ and of the Temple of Solomon", or Knights Templar.


